Thanks to those members who have donated their time, talents (and wallets) to make this possible!



THE AMERICAN LEGION JUNIOR AUXILIARY

The Earlville American Legion Junior Auxiliary was organized February 8, 1955, under the direction of Jr. Advisor Mrs. Boyd K. Smith. All members consisted of daughters of Legionnaires of the Earlville Post 549. There were nine Charter members listed, but a high membership at one time reached a total of twenty-four daughters of Legionnaires.

First Junior Chairman of the group was Patty Ann Sturgeon, daughter of Orrin and Evelyn Sturgeon. Nine other members served as Chairman over the years. The organization was very active over a ten year period. Several Juniors belonged until they reached eighteen years of age and transferred to the adult American Legion auxiliary Unit 549.

The three members to keep continuous membership in the Jr. Auxiliary and graduated were Virginia, Barbara and Joyce Smith, all three daughters of Boyd and Evelyn Smith. Joyce was a "Tiny Tot" member; thus she was the only member to have continuous eighteen-year membership. Barbara Smith was the youngest charter member at the time of organizing.

Activities of the Jr. Auxiliary members consisted of making 25 monthly tray favors for hospitalized veterans. They studied about Americanism and presented patriotic programs; assisted in selling 75 home flag sets in the community and helped Unit 549 in distributing the veteran-made poppies on Poppy Day. Several members took part in the Earlville Centennial Historical Program in the year 1963.

One of the most impressive ceremonies ever given by the Jr. Auxiliary members was when the entire group wore uniforms consisting of navy blue skirts, white blouses, navy bows and navy Legionnaire type caps. The caps were styled and made by Mrs. Jessie Sturgeon and Evelyn Smith from three Navy uniforms of an Earlville boy, Kenneth R. Sturgeon, son of Lloyd and Jessie Sturgeon, who lost his life at sea April 29, 1945. Their caps were dedicated during a very impressive Memorial Day service on May 30, 1958. During the service, each Junior came forward and placed a live poppy before the War memorial monument in memory of Kenneth Russell Sturgeon. Their caps will serve as a reminder of his sacrifice to our country.

Kristen E. Krienert, infant daughter of Kenneth and Virginia Krienert, was presented a "Tiny Tot" membership in the Junior Auxiliary Organization in 1988 by her grandfather, Legionnaire Boyd K. Smith. Daughters, granddaughters and great-granddaughters of a Legionnaire may join the American Legion junior Auxiliary as a member, even though the group is no longer active at the present time.
